PHOTOGRAPHY II

I. Course Description:

A continuation of Photography I with exploration of any of the major areas such as but not limited to: image manipulation, special effects, the use of color, and the finished print. This course may also include advanced black and white skills and effects in digital and/or traditional formats.

II. Prerequisite:

Photography I

III. Credit Hours:

Three (3) A studio class meeting six (6) clock hours per week

IV. Media:

This course may explore both traditional and digital photographic formats including both wet and digital darkrooms to generate images.

- V. Concepts and skills should include but not be limited to:
 - Photography as a medium of artistic expression where critical thought occurs through the lens
 - Learn to use technical and compositional means to make photographs more effective when dealing with a variety of subject matter.
 - Develop familiarity with the characteristics of light sensitive materials, exploring the camera and its functions as a tool for producing effective photographs.
 - To identify and discuss the history of photography; the people ideas and trends relevant to photography.
 - Develop a working knowledge of basic black and white materials and processes.
 - Develop skills and attitudes consistent with becoming a professional photographer.
 - Develop and maintain a quality photographic portfolio.
- VI. Critical Analysis:

Appropriate evaluation of the integration of design and technique, form, content and artistic intent. Discussion of the basic characteristics of the tools and materials of the medium of expressive black and white photography as well as critical issues common to most workers in the profession. Class and individual critiques.
